The Religious of the Sacred Heart (RSCJ) established a presence in Vancouver in 1911, thanks to mission expansion from their Montreal congregation. They built a Gothic Revival Convent of the Sacred Heart, a Catholic girls' boarding and day school completed in 1912.

In 1979, the Sisters withdrew, selling the property to St. George's School, and the graves on the convent grounds were relocated to St. Peter's Cemetery. Although the Sisters of the Sacred Heart did not directly minister in New Westminster, their departed members are interred there, making them part

of the city's sacred heritage. Today, alumni and former Sisters still hold reunions at the former convent building in Vancouver, where the Sacred Heart Alumnae meet annually to honor their legacy in education and faith formation.

Sisters of Providence (sp)

The Sisters of Providence, a Roman Catholic Congregation founded in 1843 by Emilie Tavernier Gamelin in Montreal, arrived in New Westminster, BC, in 1886. Committed to serving the poor and marginalized, particularly through healthcare and education, they quickly established St. Mary's Hospital in 1887. The hospital opened with 42 beds and a staff of five, marking a transformative moment in the province's healthcare history. Over the years, it evolved into

one of BC's leading surgical centres. Beyond St. Mary's, the Sisters expanded their ministry to include orphanages, boarding schools, and care homes for the elderly and disabled. In 1901, they founded St. Genevieve Orphanage and School in New Westminster, furthering their educational mission. The legacy of the Sisters of Providence lives on through Providence Health Care, one of the province's major

healthcare providers, which includes institutions like St. Paul's Hospital, Mount Saint Joseph Hospital, and Holy Family Hospital. Despite their contributions, St. Mary's Hospital closed in 2004 after 117 years. Nonetheless, the Sisters' profound influence on healthcare and social services in BC endures.

Sister of Charity of the Immaculate Conception (sric)

The Sisters of Charity of the Immaculate Conception were founded in 1854 in Saint John, New Brunswick, by Honoria Conway and Bishop Thomas Connolly to care for poor immigrants and children orphaned during the cholera epidemic. As the first English-speaking congregation established in Canada, their mission focused on education, health care, and social services for the most vulnerable. In BC, the Sisters expanded their

ministries into the Archdiocese of Vancouver, offering pastoral care, literacy programs, immigrant support, and spiritual accompaniment. Their work was often in collaboration with other women's religious communities and rooted in the Vincentian tradition of organized, compassionate service. Their quiet yet vital presence in BC reflected a deep commitment to serving marginalized communities with humility and grace.

Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, Halifax (sr halifax)

The Sisters of Charity, Halifax have had a presence in the Vancouver area for over 100 years. They first arrived in 1923 at the request of Father J.B. MacDonald, who wanted the Sisters to teach at St. Helen's Parochial School and work in the parish. From there, the Sisters expanded to convents in East Vancouver and Point Grey. The Sisters owned Seton Academy, housed in the historic Overlynn Mansion at 401 North Esmond Avenue, Burnaby and worked in Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Notre Dame, Our Lady of Sorrows, St. Joseph, and St. Jude schools. The Sisters also did parish work, visited the sick and poor and did anti-human trafficking work. As of 2025, there are two Sisters left in Vancouver.

Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd / Sisters of Good Shepherd (rgs)



The Congregation of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd, founded in France in 1835, is a Catholic religious order dedicated to helping women and girls in need. In 1893, three Sisters arrived in New Westminster and opened a home in Sapperton for orphans and penitent women. After the great fire in 1898, they relocated to Vancouver and later to White Rock, where they opened Saint Euphrasia's School.

In 1975, this became Rosemary Heights Retreat Centre, offering prayer, hospitality, and healing, especially for women in crisis. The Sisters operated the centre until 1992; it remained active under the Archdiocese of Vancouver until closing in 2015. Their legacy spans over a century of compassionate service in BC.

Sisters of the Instruction of the Child Jesus (sij)

The Sisters of the Instruction of the Child Jesus were founded in Le Puy, France, in 1667 by Anne-Marie Martel. At the invitation of Bishop Paul Durieu, OMI, the first four Sisters arrived in Canada in 1896, beginning their ministry at St. Joseph's Mission Indian Residential School in Williams Lake. They soon expanded to St. Paul's Residential School in North Vancouver (1898), Sechelt (1904), and Maillardville (1909), eventually serving across BC and Saskatchewan. A novitiate was established in Sechelt in 1911, and the Canadian mission

grew to over 100 Sisters at its height. Canada became a Region of the congregation in 1918 and 1931, and a Province in 1952. The Sisters' primary mission is education, serving both Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities through residential and day schools, catechetical instruction, and pastoral ministry. Today, they are committed to healing and Reconciliation, acknowledging their role in the history of Indian Residential Schools in Canada.

Sisters Adorers of the Precious Blood (rel. ad. p.b)



Founded in 1861 by Catherine Aurélie Caouette in Saint-Hyacinthe, Quebec, the Sisters Adorers of the Precious Blood were the first contemplative, cloistered religious community established in Canada. Dedicated to a life of prayer and seclusion, their mission is deeply spiritual: to pray for the salvation of the world and for the sanctity of Catholic clergy.

The order quickly grew, establishing foundations across Canada and beyond, including Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Quebec City, London, Regina, Edmonton, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Vancouver, Calgary,

and Prince Edward Island, as well as internationally in Oregon, Cuba, and Japan.

In Vancouver, their convent was located at 3651 Hudson Street, Vancouver

The Sisters live a quiet life of devotion and manual work, sustaining their community through the preparation and sale of altar bread, handcrafted religious items, and donations. Their distinctive habit, a white tunic with a red scapular and sash, symbolizes their dedication to the Precious Blood of Christ.

Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement

The Franciscan Sisters of the Atonement served Vancouver's Downtown Eastside from 1926 to 2011, offering compassionate care to the poor, mentally ill, and addicted. Originally assisting the Japanese community, especially during World War II, the Sisters later became known for their daily soup, sandwiches, and clothing outreach to the most marginalized. With no new vocations to continue the mission, the convent on Cordova Street closed in 2011. The Archdiocese of Vancouver committed to maintaining the food program, and the Missionaries of Charity, known for their work with the poor, moved into the former convent to continue the Sisters' legacy of service.

Their work is essential to maintaining vibrant parish life, delivering Catholic teaching, and supporting local communities across the Lower Mainland.

Monsignor Louis Jean Stanislas Forget was born in Ceaucé, Normandy, and led a life marked by service across continents. Ordained in Edmonton in 1905, he ministered in Alberta before illness led him to Ireland and then the U.S., where he served rural missions in Oregon. In 1917, he joined the Archdiocese of Vancouver and became pastor of St. Patrick's Parish. Over 39 years, he built schools, cleared parish debt, and guided over 800 converts and 100 vocations. Known for his devotion, discipline, and dry wit, Monsignor Forget left a deep impact on clergy

Jesuits (sj)

The Jesuits, or Society of Jesus, are a Catholic religious order founded in 1540 by St. Ignatius of Loyola, known for their work in education, missionary outreach, and social justice. In BC, Jesuits primarily served Indigenous communities and remote missions, notably in the Kootenays and along the coast, blending pastoral care with cultural and linguistic engagement.
